

## MESSAGE FROM PRESIDENT & CEO




Since stepping into the role of President and CEO last October, I have been inspired by the deep commitment of the JA British Columbia community.

## **PROGRAMS AT A GLANCE**





### **Elementary**

In February, Westcot Elementary students from West Vancouver explored real-world money skills through JA's More than Money program. They learned how to create a business plan, estimate start-up costs, track finances, and make smart decisions around earning, saving, and spending.



### **Middle School**

In April, young people from Twin Rivers Elementary in Castlegar took part in the popular Business of Our Own program. They developed products, learned how to manage money, and brought their ideas to life by making real sales at their school's sales day.







### **High School**

At Heritage Woods Secondary in Port Moody, students participated in the in-school JA Company Program, where two classes explored the risks and rewards of entrepreneurship. Their efforts culminated in a market day event, giving them a real-world opportunity to promote and sell their products directly to customers.

### YOUNG BC ENTREPRENEURS SHINE

Two of JABC's after-school JA Company Program student teams were named national finalists in JA Canada's Company of the Year Awards.
Dicestination (Technology category) created a souvenir dice and scavenger hunt game, while S.E.E.D. (Social Enterprise category) designed culturally inspired t-shirts that celebrate identity and community.





## PROGRAMS AT A GLANCE

### JABC TechWorks

This dynamic experience was delivered in person at Vancouver Community College in April and also made available virtually on demand to classes across the province. The virtual format included a live panel and on-demand videos with demos from local companies, helping youth explore careers in tech and high-opportunity jobs.








### **Discover Your Pitch**

After weeks of workshops and competitions, seven top student teams from across B.C. advanced to the provincial finals in May. In front of an audience of close to 90 guests, they pitched their business ideas to a panel of judges, showcasing the innovation and growth they had developed throughout the program.



#### **JABC Masterclass**

Students from West Vancouver secondary schools attended JABC Masterclass in June, where top B.C. business leaders, Amar Doman (BC Lions) and Jeff Fuller (Joey's Restaurants), shared real-world advice. Moderated by Hayley Woodin Hastings (Business in Vancouver), the experience featured personal stories, student Q&A, and practical tips for life after school.

### Start Up to Success: Empowering Youth in Prince George

This year, JABC launched a pilot program in partnership with YMCA Prince George designed to support youth facing barriers to education and employment.

Start Up to Success brought together 20 high school students aged 16 to 18 for a 16week, in-person learning experience featuring three of JA's most impactful programs: Success Skills, JA Company Program, and Personal Finance.

Facilitated by JA volunteers, the program helped students build confidence, strengthen their teamwork and communication skills, explore entrepreneurship, and develop

essential financial literacy.

The experience culminated in a student-led market event in June. where participants showcased and sold their business products. A community celebration followed on July 3, 2025, with the Prince George mayor in attendance to recognize their accomplishments.



This pilot reflects JABC's ongoing commitment to reaching underserved communities and providing youth with the knowledge, tools, and mentorship they need to shape their futures. We are excited to build on this success and bring similar opportunities to more young people across the province in the year ahead.

## PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT





### **Empowering Indigenous Youth Through Culture & Entrepreneurship**

JABC partnered with UBC Sauder School of Business and the Vancouver School Board this year to deliver a specialized version of the JA Company Program for Indigenous Learners.

Held over 16 weeks at four Vancouver high schools, the program gave students the opportunity to explore entrepreneurship in a culturally grounded and supportive



environment.

With the support of JABC volunteers, students developed a range of business ideas, including a concept for an Indigenous Night Market that reflected thoughtful engagement with community and culture.

The program helped participants build confidence, connect with business concepts, and bring their ideas to life in a meaningful way.

Partners and supporters celebrated the achievements of approximately 30 students at a closing event held at UBC Sauder on June 19, 2025. Educators shared encouraging feedback, noting that the experience helped students see new possibilities for their future.

# BUSINESS LAUREATES OF BC HALL OF FAME




