


ADVANCING OUR STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

PRIORITIES IN ACTION



Empowered the Underserved:

An initiative with YMCA Northern BC (March-June 2025)

The specially developed Start Up to Success program offered 20 underserved

youth in Prince George meaningful, hands-on learning in career exploration, entrepreneurship, and financial literacy. A combination of three high-impact JA programs, it was supported by seven community volunteers and concluded with a student-led market showcase and celebration event.

Cultivate Partnerships:

In collaboration with UBC Sauder School of Business and the Vancouver School Board (February-June 2025)

The JA Company Program for Indigenous Learners blended business education with Coast Salish culture and perspectives. Delivered by volunteers in four schools to 49 participants, students built community, explored entrepreneurship, strengthened financial literacy, and wrapped up with a closing celebration.

A SNAPSHOT OF OUR YEAR



January: JA Leadership Breakfast

Nearly 200 guests from 97 companies attended the JA Leadership Breakfast, where business leaders shared insights on innovation, legacy, and transition in family enterprises.



March: Virtual JABC TechWorks

Starting in March, virtual JABC TechWorks engaged thousands of students across B.C., offering flexible work-readiness learning through live panels and on-demand videos.

November: Financial Literacy Day

Victoria High School students participated in a special Financial Literacy Day at the BCI offices, where volunteers delivered JA program lessons in financial literacy and work readiness.



February: Nobel Peace Prize Nomination

JA Worldwide was once again nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize, recognizing its commitment to empowering youth and advancing economic empowerment, prosperity, and peace worldwide.



April: In-person JABC TechWorks

Over 200 students joined JABC TechWorks at Vancouver Community College, connecting with 40 industry volunteers to explore B.C.'s fastgrowing tech sector.





May: Discover Your Pitch

After weeks of workshops and competitions, 7 top student teams advanced to the provincial finals, where they pitched their business ideas to a panel of judges.



May: Success Skills Summit

Nearly 100 Grade 8 students from North and West Vancouver took part in a JA summit at Grouse Mountain, building resilience and life skills through interactive workshops and inspiring talks.



May: Skilled Trades Summit

JABC's 2025 Skilled Trades Summit at Camosun College brought 160 students together for real-world exposure to skilled trades.



June: CPI Closing Ceremony

As part of the JA Company Program for Indigenous Learners in-school, students gathered at UBC Sauder to celebrate their achievements, showcase their ventures, and explore post-secondary pathways.



June: JABC Masterclass


Hundreds of students from West Vancouver attended JABC Masterclass, where top business leaders shared real-world insights and advice to help prepare them for life after school.

FROM STUDENT TO VOLUNTEER TO STAFF

Ramona Hooper's journey with JABC began in 1993, when a JA program changed the course of her life.

What started in her high school business class became a turning point, giving her the skills and confidence to make opportunities for herself despite early challenges. She discovered self-efficacy, the belief that she could create, decide, and shape the direction of her life.

By 1995, Ramona had returned as a volunteer, bringing the same transformative experiences to youth in classrooms. That early involvement set her on a special path. Ramona started her first business in high school, became a pilot, and built a career in finance and technology.

Today, as a Program Manager on the JABC team, she manages programs across B.C. She also continues to volunteer in classrooms

and in 2025-26 will deliver her **100th JA Program**, a milestone that marks her continued work to help youth take control of their future.





